

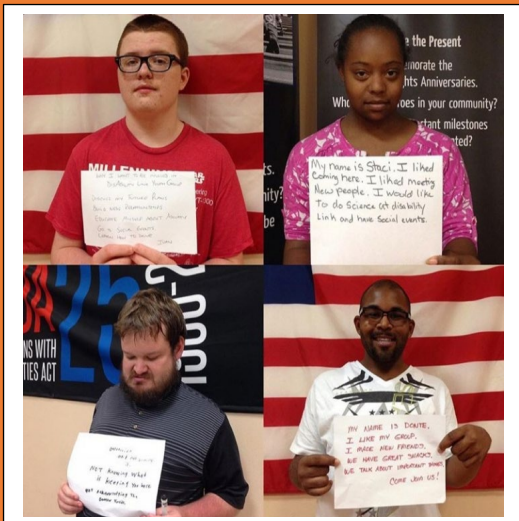

## Youth Services

### Independent Living Skills

Whether it's developing a budget, finding employment, becoming a volunteer, learning to use mass transit or any other personal goal, we offer individualized trainings that enhances or maintains a person's independence. We also have a wellness gym and computer lab to assist in your own personal goals.

### Advocacy

It is important to make your voice heard and create the change you want to see. We offer services for personal and systems advocacy.

### Transition

We support people to live in the communities of their choice, whether it's moving from your parent's house or transitioning from school to adulthood. During the summer we offer a series of summer programming for students with disabilities between the ages of 14 and 29 that focus on pre-transition and transitional services. In addition, we have many programs that revolve around young adults, parents with disabilities, and parents with children who have a disability.

### Peer Counseling

The support of a peer is both powerful and meaningful, we incorporate peer support in all of our services.

### Information and Referral

We maintain a database of local resources that range from housing to legal assistance.

### Additional Independent Living Services

We offer additional services that depend on partnerships with the community and funding availability.

## Empowering Young Adults Locating Employment Avenues through Peer Support

### Pre-Employment Transition Services

- Job exploration counseling;
- Work-based learning experiences;
- Counseling on opportunities for enrollment in postsecondary educational programs;
- Workplace readiness training to develop social skills and independent living;
- Instruction in self-advocacy, which may include peer mentoring.

### Programs:

- **Empowering Young Adults Locating Employment Avenues through Peer Support Summer and School Program**
- **disABILITY LINK's Empowering Our Youth (EOY) Getting Ready for Opportunities in Work (GROW) week-long program**

### Sessions:

- Lesson plans for classroom held on location at schools
- Lesson plans for classroom held on location at disABILITY LINK
- Individual sessions

### Eligibility:

- Secondary School students between the ages of 14 and 22 and under an IEP or 504 plan.

### How to apply for the program:

- Ask your high school teacher or counselor for a referral.

**Individuals needing reasonable accommodations should contact our office at least (3) business days prior to the event so that arrangements can be made.**
