Pre-ETS Scope and Sequence for Middle School Students (Grades 6-8)

Introduction to the Scope and Sequence

Welcome to **Pathway to Dreams**, the Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) curriculum designed specifically for students with disabilities in grades 6-8. This program is part of a five-year initiative by the Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency (GVRA), funded through the Rehabilitation Services Administration's Disability Innovation Fund. The curriculum's purpose is to introduce participating Georgia middle schoolers to skills necessary for obtaining competitive integrated employment after completing their educational journeys.

Key Partnerships for Success

The success of this project is driven by important partnerships between GVRA, local school districts, nine Georgia-based Centers for Independent Living, the Georgia Department of Education, and other entities. GVRA's implementation team, Pathways to Partnerships (P2P), will work with these centers, which are distributed across the state, to coordinate programming in local school districts. We are excited about this collaboration because in addition to soft skills curriculum, it provides students in middle school, along with their families, information regarding available support, services, and resources prior to entering high school.

Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) and the Grant

Currently under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), GVRA offers five essential Pre-ETS to eligible students and eligible Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) customers. These services are designed to help students aged 14-21, including those with disabilities, to prepare for successful transitions into the workforce. They include:

- 1. **Job Exploration Counseling**: Helping students understand various career options and the skills needed for different jobs.
- 2. **Counseling on Postsecondary Opportunities**: Guiding students in exploring educational paths, including college and vocational training programs.
- 3. **Workplace Readiness Training**: Developing essential skills such as communication, teamwork, and problem-solving to prepare students for the workplace.
- 4. **Work-Based Learning:** Providing hands-on experiences and internships to help students gain practical skills in real-world settings.
- 5. **Self-Advocacy Instruction**: Empowering students to understand their rights and advocate for themselves in educational and professional environments.

Pathway to Dreams will provide soft skills from three of the Pre-ETS categories to participating middle school students (aged 10-14). Lessons are tailored specifically for grades 6-8 and include: **Job Exploration, Workplace Readiness, and Self-Advocacy.** By laying this foundation earlier, students learn critical soft skills, become better connected with available resources, and learn more about future educational opportunities.

Introduction to the Curriculum

Lessons in Pathway to Dreams are designed to be completed within 30 minutes but can be extended to 45 minutes to allow for deeper exploration and practice. The lessons incorporate a Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework to accommodate diverse learning styles and needs. This ensures that every student has equitable access to the content and can participate fully in the learning experience.

Using this structure helps meet the needs of all students by providing multiple means of engagement, representation, and action/expression. This approach is crucial in special education settings, where students have varying abilities, backgrounds, and learning preferences. Throughout the program, instructional lessons will:

- Engage students by offering various ways to participate in lessons.
- Represent information in multiple formats (e.g., visual, auditory, tactile) to cater to different learning styles.
- Allow students to express what they know through different means (e.g., writing, speaking, role playing, discussing).

Sample Accommodations

To ensure that all students can successfully participate in and benefit from the lessons, the following are sample accommodations for an inclusive setting that can be utilized as appropriate:

- 1. Extended time for completing tasks or assignments.
- 2. Mini-Breaks during lessons to prevent fatigue.
- 3. Use of fidget tool
- 4. Visual aids (pictures, etc.)
- 5. Auditory supports like recordings or text-to-speech tools.
- 6. Peer assistance or small group work to provide additional support.
- 7. Alternative seating arrangements to reduce distractions.
- 8. Use of technology (e.g., tablets, laptops) to assist with learning tasks.
- 9. Modified materials (e.g., simplified text, larger print) to meet individual needs.
- 10. Frequent check-ins and feedback to monitor progress and understanding.

Incorporating these accommodations will create an inclusive and supportive learning environment where every student can thrive and develop the skills necessary for future success.

Lesson	Pre-ETS	Brief Description
Introduction to Program	N/A	Pre-ETS instructors introduce students to the curriculum and engage with interactive relationship building activities.
1. Personal Interests & Strengths	Job Exploration	Superhero Strengths: Uncovering Your Interests and Hidden Talents: This engaging lesson focuses on helping students identify and understand their personal interests and strengths. It includes an interactive vocabulary Kahoot quiz to introduce key terms, a group discussion to explore students' hobbies and skills, a personal reflection activity to deepen self-awareness, and a fun Strengths Charades game to wrap up the learning experience. Students will gain valuable insight into their unique talents and how these can shape their future aspirations.
2. Career Inventory - Part 1	Job Exploration	Career Quest: Discover Your Future: Students will embark on a journey to explore potential careers by watching a brief "All About Working" video that introduces key terms and completing a Career Interest Inventory to identify their personal job interests. To wrap up, students will participate in a reflective activity where they share their discoveries reinforcing their understanding and sparking excitement about their future possibilities. This lesson combines multimedia, self-discovery, and peer interaction to make career exploration fun and meaningful.
3. Career Inventory - Part 2	Job Exploration	Ready to be a Career Explorer? Reveal Your Top Picks and Begin Mapping Your Path: Students will dive into career exploration by watching a short video titled, "Intro to Career Clusters," which introduces key terms and Georgia's 17 Career Cluster categories. Following the video, students will engage in a fun, interactive game where they match specific jobs to the appropriate Career Clusters as each category is discussed. The lesson will conclude with students discussing their personal Career Interest Inventory results, helping them identify which clusters their interests align with and what potential jobs they might want to pursue within those clusters.
4. Self-Advocacy	Self-Advocacy	Speak Up! Introduction to Self-Advocacy: This lesson introduces students to the concept of self-advocacy. Through discussing various scenarios, they explore practical strategies such as speaking clearly, asking questions, and expressing feelings. The lesson culminates in students creating personalized self-advocacy kits, equipping them with tools and strategies to help them advocate for themselves in school and beyond.
5. Goal Setting - Part 1	Workplace Readiness	Goal Getter: Setting the Stage for Success: Students will learn the importance of setting achievable goals through the SMART criteria. The lesson features the 3-minute video, "SMART Goals for Kids," followed by a discussion and reflection on the content. The teacher will model the development of SMART goals, and students will work together with teacher guidance to build SMART goals as a group.
6. Goal Setting - Part 2	Workplace Readiness	Goal Crushers: Kickoff to Achieving Work Readiness: In this lesson, students will review the concept of SMART goals and individually define and create their own SMART goal tailored to their career aspirations and action steps. Students will wrap up the lesson participating in the "Goal Sorter Showdown: Racing to SMART Success" game where teams will compete showing their grasp of effective goal-setting strategies and teamwork skills.

7. Communication Skills	Workplace Readiness	Chat Champions: Building Communication Skills: This lesson is designed to empower students with essential communication techniques through engaging activities. Students will explore the fundamentals of effective communication. Through teacher modeling and interactive role-plays, they will learn to navigate various scenarios, such as handling disagreements respectfully, self-advocating when needed, and expressing emotions calmly. The lesson emphasizes practical skills applicable both in school and everyday interactions.
8. Teamwork/Collaboration	Workplace Readiness	Collab Crew: Teamwork Adventures Await: This dynamic lesson is aimed at highlighting the value of teamwork and collaboration. Through an interactive "Escape Room" activity, students engage in challenges that emphasize communication, problem-solving, and mutual support. As students actively participate in this experience, they not only learn the importance of working together effectively but also apply these skills in a fun and engaging way.
9. Basic Workplace Skills - Part 1	Workplace Readiness	Are You a Workplace Wizard? Let's Cast Those Essential Skills! In this lesson, students will practice basic workplace skills: communication, teamwork, and problem-solving. Real-life examples will be used to illustrate the importance of those skills. In small groups, students will work through workplace scenarios that require the application of these skills promoting collaboration and critical thinking.
10. Basic Workplace Skills – Part 2	Workplace Readiness	Game On! Leveling Up in the Workplace: Students will learn about workplace etiquette and responsibility focusing on punctuality, dress code, and professional behavior. Real life scenarios will be used to illustrate the importance of those skills. Students will participate in an interactive game answering questions related to workplace etiquette and responsibility.

5. Stress Management	Workplace Readiness	Feeling the Pressure? Think Before you Act: Students learn to recognize common stressors and stress management techniques. Interactive activities will immerse students in applying skills acquired relating to the importance of appropriately responding and maintaining composure.
6. Organization	Workplace Readiness	From Mess to Success - Workplace Solutions: Students embrace effective organization skills and tools to empower them in enhancing productivity and success in academic and vocational settings. In reflection, students gain perspective on the impact organization has on being successful.

Additionally, they discover the value of having a growth mindset versus a fixed mindset. 6. Communication Skills	Workplace Readiness	Communication Toolbox for Success This lesson equips students with skills for effective communication in building a toolbox of skills such as initiating/responding in conversation, staying on topic, turntaking, and body language.
7. Positive Appearance	Workplace Readiness	Polished and Positive – Shine Inside and out! Through this interactive lesson, students become equipped with skills for basic hygiene and grooming, appropriate dress, and etiquette in social situations, which are useful across personal and professional environments.
8. Positive Attitude & Teamwork	Workplace Readiness	Empowerment Express: Developing Positive Attitudes and Adaptability In this lesson students engage in peer discussion and collaboration to learn and apply teamwork strategies, adaptability/flexibility for real-world scenarios, and solutions to common problems, to empower them in being successful in future vocational settings.
